The Connecticut Radio Information System (CRIS) is Connecticut's only radioreading service—a non-profit that has been providing audio access for individuals who are blind or print-challenged for nearly four decades.

CRIS broadcasts 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, from regional satellite studios in Danbury, Norwalk, Norwich, Trumbull, West Haven, and their broadcast center in Windsor.

CRIS features articles published in more than 70 newspapers and magazines, including award-winning children's magazines available online and on-demand. Programs powered by CRIS Radio include CRIS Radio, CRIS Streaming (hospitals and other health care facilities, such as nursing homes and assisted living facilities), CRIS on Demand, CRISKids, CRISAccess (museums), and CRIS En Español. Currently, 86 schools are accessing CRISKids Audio Library, in which they offer custom recording for teachers to meet the specific needs of their students.

CRIS programs keep people informed about the world, the nation, Connecticut, and their local communities, and has proven to be a vital resource for individuals unable to access printed material. CRISKids offers educators a low-cost tool to help improve student literacy, reading comprehension, and reading ability.

CRIS employs a staff of four full-time and three part-time people. They rely on nearly 300 volunteers statewide to help with the production, programming, voice talent, and day-to-day operations.

2023 Bridge-Builder Legacy Award



Helen Jones

1946 - 2022

Helen Jones was a 2022 Bridge-Builder honoree.

She was a Windsor resident for many decades and was dedicated to serving others in her community by sharing Windsor's history.

Previously Helen was an active member at the Wilson Congregational Church and participated in numerous events. Later she attended the First Church in Windsor and was a dynamic asset, involved in spiritually supporting many members.

Helen helped many youths and young adults in town with her positive attitude, kind spirit, and earnest listening.

Helen's enthusiasm and positivity helped many in Windsor feel accepted and loved. She had countless meaningful conversations about race, history, and current events that encouraged Windsor residents to look at matters from a new perspective.



Mary's Place, A Center for Grieving Children and Families, is a nonprofit organization whose mission is to provide an atmosphere of trust where families who are grieving a death can share their experiences, receive support, and find comfort. Mary's Place provides a safe environment which encourages and supports children as they grieve in ways uniquely appropriate to their developmental stage. Through the use of tools such as art, music, and movement, children can express themselves without feeling different or alone and connect with peers who have also experienced a death.

Mary's Place grew out of the vision and generosity of Carmon Community Funeral Homes and the insight of Mary Keane. Before founding Mary's Place, Mary was an oncology nurse-clinician. In the course of her work she recognized the need for a support system for young people who had suffered the death of a loved one. This led her to organize a young widow and widowers support group in 1989. In 1991 she started a children's support group, which met in her apartment. As the number of children grew, the group moved to the student lounge at Loomis Chaffee School in Windsor Connecticut. In 1996, with the help and support of the Carmon family, Mary's Place was formally established as a Center for Grieving Children and Families and is located at 6 Poquonock Avenue in Windsor.

Mary passed away on September 22, 2021. The center is very grateful for the beautiful person Mary was and for the legacy she left for them to carry on.

Today, Mary's Place has several different peer support groups for children and families. All groups meet twice a month throughout the year.



Amani Rogers

Amani Rogers is a high school teacher at the Academy of Aerospace and Engineering in Windsor. She teaches math to a diverse student population. In her classroom, all students have the opportunity to learn and not just understand math, but understand each other. Amani shows students daily that we are more alike than different.

Amani is the Robotics Club advisor. In this role, which is beyond her teaching responsibilities, she leads a group of about 30 students who collectively build, program, test, and operate robots in casual and competitive environments. If you have ever worked with teenagers, you know to get 40 of them to work together on anything is quite an accomplishment. Amani does this by insisting on mutual respect, kindness, and considerate treatment.

At the beginning of the school year, Amani joined the Equity Leadership team and has emerged as the leader of this group. This position is also beyond her teaching responsibilities. Additionally, she designed the school's Racial Justice Awareness Week curriculum and was a major contributor to the school's Racial Justice Awareness celebration.

Amani consistently expects excellence, acts with courage, demands equity, and embraces collaboration.
